Food Safety Seminar 2019

When you visit a restaurant or a retail food establishment in the Los Angeles County, there will be a laminated letter - A, B or C- greeting you at their store front. Have you ever stopped to question how these letters are given? Or wonder if they can they tell you something about the cleanliness and safety of the establishment you are about to enter? While the implications of these grades mirror that of report cards in school, there is a system of state and federal laws, concepts of food safety and trends in the industry that are taken into consideration.

With that in mind, the Asian American Economic Development Enterprises, Inc. (AAEDE) partnered with the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health- Environmental Health Division (DPH-EH) and Southern California Edison to hold the Retail Food Inspection & Regulation Seminar. This was held on July 18, 2019 at the Hilton, San Gabriel with free admission and afternoon snacks. The goal: to aid restaurant and retail food owners and employees in keeping their establishments safe, healthy and sustainable.

o accomplish this, the afternoon began with the 49th district Assemblymember Ed Chau's opening remarks. This emphasized the relevance of food inspections and regulations to public health. But it was Mr. David Chun, the Chief Environmental Health Specialist for the Consultative Services of the

DPH-EH, who delivered the "meat" of the seminar.

rirst, the role of the Consultative Services in carrying out the Retail Food Inspections was discussed. He also enumerated various Critical Major and Minor Violations and how they are applied in the Grading and Point Deduction System. Next, he went over the Food Safety Requirements and Food Handler Card Laws. To end it off, Allen Cheng and Adriana Miranda of the Consultative Department as well as District Chiefs Cindy Chen, Gail Morison and Ken Habaradas accompanied Mr. Chun in answering questions and giving input during the Q&A portion.




